DOWNTOWN DUBLIN VISION GREAT FOR BUSINESS

City to decide on plan before end of year



The City of Dublin has benefited greatly over the years from its Downtown Dublin retail businesses, an area right at the crossroads of I-580/680. The area was developed while a part of Alameda County before Dublin incorporated in 1982 and while it made the county cash registers ring, the area lacked in public spaces and aesthetics.

But times they are a changin'! Downtown has seen movement and changes in its profile; all the car dealerships have gone to East Dublin, a decided upgrade in variety of restaurants and housing to provide customers for the retailers. Now Dublin wants to incorporate more of a traditional "Downtown" feel to the experience.

The City of Dublin hired Urban Field Studio, a planning group to assist in the process. Of the three options presented to date, residents seem to prefer the "Town Square" concept which would extend a future "Main Street" from the BART station on Golden Gate Drive. The changes will be developer driven and paid for by developers. But to show they are serious, the City has set aside \$5 million to aid in infrastructure and improvements. The plan is expected to come before the City Council by the end of the year and then the fun can begin.

"This allows Dublin to bring some new renovations and vibrancy to the original part of town," said Mayor Haubert. "It will bring a sense of pride in the community."


VALLEY LINK'S VISION TO MODERNIZE REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION SYSTEM

November, 2020 Vote Key to Transportation Overhaul

Convinced that the BART Board of Directors will not fund a link to Livermore, local officials in the last year have moved with amazing speed to form a transit authority to design and build a rail link between the Dublin/Pleasanton BART station and Lathrop in the Central Valley. The vision is a 10-station commuter line, with BART-like service in the Tri-Valley, which could start carrying passengers in five to seven years.

The Tri-Valley-San Joaquin Valley Regional Rail Authority has a tall order; fund the \$1.8 Billion project, but it does have a head start! It has about a third of its funding needs — in part because of the BART Board's decision to not move forward with a project. That opened the door for the Valley Link project to receive some \$400 million in sales tax revenues voters approved in 2014.

The Rail Authority Board members, led by long-time transportation champion Supervisor Scott Haggerty, are made up of elected officials in Alameda, San Joaquin and Contra



Costa Counties. The City of Dublin is represented by Councilwoman Melissa Hernandez.

They have asked that it be included in a \$100 billion transportation tax measure that could be on November 2020 ballots in the nine Bay Area counties. Details on the type of tax and its duration are still being discussed. ACE also is seeking \$200 million from that measure to upgrade other Bay Area tracks so its service can expand to six round trips on weekdays by 2026.

If you think traffic is bad now; it is going to get worse! Traffic along I-580, measured by the time drivers spend crawling along at less than 35 mph, grew 27 percent between 2014 and 2016, and is estimated to get even worse — growing 60 percent by 2040.

As the November 2020 Tax measure makes its way on the local ballot, you will hear more about the benefits the vision brings. Valley Links is a project whose time has come and worthy of Dublin business support.

ORGANICS AND RECYCLING COLLECTION

Mandatory for Dublin Businesses Effective January 1, 2020



Starting January 1, 2020, Dublin businesses that generate significant* quantities of compostable materials (organics) and all multi-family properties with five or more units will be required to provide adequate on-site organics collection service under Alameda County's Mandatory Composting and Recycling Ordinance. Organics includes food scraps, food-soiled paper, and plant debris.

In addition, all Dublin multi-family properties with five or more units and all businesses must have adequate on-site collection service for **recyclable materials**.

Dublin joins the remaining jurisdictions in Alameda County where recycling and organics collection are mandatory for

multi-family properties and businesses. The goal is to ensure that less than 10 percent of the waste sent to landfills by 2020 is recyclable or compostable material.

> East. "Reaching out to the Pacific Rim may be an ideal way to grow the Dublin Sister City Association", said the first-term Councilman. "I am working with the local community and established businesses to gauge interest". Kumagai organized a visit with the San Francisco

Japanese Consulate General, a Dublin first. "They were quite impressed with what they saw in Dublin", said Kumagai. "We were hosted by a Japanese affiliate in Dublin Toyota, there is a lot of opportunity here." So whether it is the established relationship in Ireland or new opportunities in Japan, India, Mexico and beyond; lots of chances for Dublin, CA businesses to get on the map.
